Collection Description:

Alanson Bates (1772-1842) was the son of Capt. John Bates, a yeoman farmer in Webster, Mass., who saw action during the Revolutionary War. His son, Alanson, continued farming his father's large holdings in Webster while he ran a tavern called the "Fox and Hounds" in the farmhouse. Bates also was active in civic affairs, serving as Webster selectman, 1833 to 1837. His son, Nelson Bates (1801-1889), closed the tavern and operated the land as a prosperous farm, well into the 1880s. He was a prominent figure in Webster during the nineteenth century. To this day, the Bates farmhouse is owned by direct descendants of Alanson Bates.

This collection consists of two folio account books and one folder of loose farm accounts and a few legal documents for the same time period. The first folio volume contains the farm accounts, 1799-1849, of Alanson Bates, while the second volume, 1826-1866, holds the farm accounts of his son, Nelson. The entries concern specific farm produce and meat sold, to whom and at what cost; labor costs paid to hired hands; cutting and selling of wood; and the manner of payment made by their debtors.
