The issue for Apr. 24, 1847 has the publisher as Fleeson & Palmer, dropping the "& Co." In English.

[Matamoros] Daily Ranchero (1865-1866?)

Daily. Edited and published by Maltby Brothers & Kinney (H.A. Maltby, W.H. Maltby, Somers Kinney). This was printed on a half – sheet. The earliest issue at AAS is July 5, 1865, vol. 1, no. 37. The issue of Feb 23, 1866, vol. 1, no. 234 is a larger sheet (61 cm. compared to 47 cm. for the 1865 issues) of yellow paper printed in English on one side. The other side is printed in Spanish and has the title, *El Ranchero Diario*. For this issue it is edited by H.A. Maltby and Somers Kinney. David F. Whiting is listed as translator.

Weekly. Edited by H. McLeod and published by I.N. Fleeson. It states that "The REPUBLIC will be printed at Matamoros during its occupation by the American troops, weekly, or oftener, as circumstances may require." Published in English and Spanish. Inside the Spanish title is *Republica de Rio Grande y Amiga de Los Pueblos*. The only issue at AAS is June 6, 1846, vol. 1, no. 2. Continued by *The American Flag* (Matamoros).

Tri-weekly. Began Sept. 20, 1847. Published by [John H.] Peebles & [Jas. R.] Barnard. Published in English and Spanish. The Spanish section is titled *Estrella Americana*. After the issue for Oct. 10, 1847, it became the *Daily American Star*. The earliest issue at AAS is Sept. 20, 1847, vol. 1, no. 1.

[Mexico City] Daily American Star (1847-1848)

Daily. Began Oct. 12, 1847 and ceased publication May 30, 1848.. Published by [John H.] Peebles & [Jas. R.] Barnard. Published in English and Spanish. The Spanish section is titled *Estrella Americana*. It succeeds the tri-weekly edition of the *American Star*, continuing the numbering, starting with vol. 1, no. 10. Starting with the issue of Feb. 23, 1848 the newspaper was published just by John H. Peebles. An article on page 2 notes that the partnership of Peebles & Barnard has been dissolved. A weekly edition was published at the same time. Previously published in Jalapa and Puebla.

Semi-weekly. The prospectus is dated April 1, 1835 and numbered 0. It is in Spanish, French, English, Italian and German. At the end, it has "Imprenta a cargo de Miguel Gonzalez." The first regular issue is dated May 2, 1835, no. 1 and is printed by Ignacio Cumplido. The majority of the articles are in Spanish. After the issue date June 24, 1835, no. 16, publication was suspended until Feb. 29, 1836 when it resumed publication in New Orleans as a weekly by J.A. Gaux and continues the numbering.

The issue for Apr. 10, 1847 is listed as being published tri-weekly. In the prospectus of the first issue it notes that they are "no strangers to the army, (one of us having been associated with the *American* Flag, of Matamoros, and the other two, editors of the *Tampico Sentinel*, the pioneer American papers in Mexico).... The earliest issue at AAS is Apr. 3, 1847, vol. 1, no. 1. AAS also has a Photostat of the Apr. 26, 1847 extra issue.
