

OBITUARY.

THEODORE FRELINGHUYSEN DWIGHT.

Theodore Frelinghuysen Dwight,* the son of Almon and Cyria White Dwight, was born at Auburn, N.Y., June 11, 1846, and died at Boston, Mass., February 3, 1917. As a young man, he was a clerk in a wholesale hardware house at Auburn, and in 1867 took a clerical position at San Francisco, where he remained for four years, and where he was active in Y. M. C. A. work. In 1871 he came to New York City where he occupied a position in the book-store of G. P. Putnam & Sons. From 1883 to 1888 he was Chief of Bureau of Rolls and Library at Washington, and from April, 1892 to April, 1894, he was librarian of the Boston Public Library. In 1895 he edited the Papers of the Military Historical Society of Massachusetts. In 1900 he went abroad and took up his residence at La Tour de Peilz, Vaud, Switzerland. In 1904 he was appointed consular agent at Vevey, which position he retained until 1913. He then returned to this country and made Boston his home until his death. Mr. Dwight was elected a member of this Society in April 1885.
