All American editions of Metamorphosis, 1036.1-1036.36, are an oblong sheet of paper usually 33+ cm. by 28+ cm., printed on the recto and verso and folded perpendicularly three times into 4 leaves 8+ cm. wide. The top 8+ cm. and bottom 6+ cm. of the sheet are now horizontally folded inward over the central 14 cm. and four .5 mm. pieces are cut out of these folded portions between the leaves to a depth of 8 cm. along the top fold and 6 mm. along the bottom fold, so that each page has a top flap, or extension 8 cm. long and a bottom flap 6 cm. long. Pages [2-5] on the verso of the sheet each show an illustration. Contiguous pages [1], [8], [7], on the recto of the sheet are blank in 1036.1 but in later editions may be printed or illustrated. These are followed by p. [6] on the recto, with 12 lines of verse enclosed in a border of type ornaments, and is the back of p. [5]. In these booklets the recto and verso of the original sheet will be considered rather than the sides of the individual leaves after folding. Pages [2] and [3], [4] and [5] when folded have facing full page illustrations. The recto of each top and bottom flap on being folded inwardly come together at the middle and form a picture with 4 lines of verse, enclosed in a border of printer's ornaments above it. These pages formed by the union of two flaps, "a" and "b", designating upper and lower flaps respectively, have the same page numbers with "a" or "b" added as the underlying illustrations. On the verso of each top and bottom flap, or the underneath portion when folded, there are 12 lines of verse. By lifting or folding down the flaps combinations of illustrations on the flaps with portions of the underlying page form new pictures. Thus when flaps [2a] and [2b] are folded over p. [2], a full page illustration of Adam is seen. If flap [2a] is lifted, the upper portion of p. [2] comes to view and the illustration changes to Eve. When flap [2b] is turned downward, so that all of p. [2] comes to view, Eve turns into a mermaid. In like manner the cut of the lion, flaps [3a] and [3b], on lifting flap [3a] changes into a griffin, with the combination of upper p. [3] and flap [3b]. When flap [3b] is turned down, bringing all of p. [3] to view, the picture changes into an eagle with an infant in his claws. Flap [4a] shows a festooned drapery, held in three places, hanging over the upper fourth of a heart. Flap [4b] depicts a

gentleman with a cane looking at a fox seated on a column. When flap [4b] is turned down, the lower three fourths of a heart comes to view, lying between the legs of a table. On raising flap [4a], all of p. [4] is shown which is a cut of a man counting out money on a table with the three-quarter heart below it. Combined flaps [5a] and [5b] depict a front and larger view of the gentleman with a cane already seen on opposite flap [4b]. When flap [5b] is turned down, the lower portion of the underlying illustration, p. [5], is a man dying in bed. On turning up flap [5a] the complete illustration, p. [5], shows an erect skeleton, in front of a coffin, holding a downward pointed arrow in the right hand, and standing over the bed of a dying man. At the top and bottom of the illustration on p. [2-5] there is a border 10 mm. wide composed of an upper case alphabet, numerals 1-9 and 0, which according to the statement on the title-page of 1036.9 were printed "To Aid Females In Marking Linen, &c." The bottom border on p. [5] has the author's name "B. Sands" followed by an ornamental grouping of squares which does not resemble any letter of the alphabet. This border is present in all editions except 1036.12. From 1807 on a titlepage is always on p. [1]. The 1810 edition has illustrations on p. [7] and [8]. From 1810-1820 pages [1], [8], [7], [6] are on the recto of the sheet and are either printed, illustrated or both. The text of 1036.1 is curious and rewritten from the English edition of 1654. For comparison's sake, the first 12 sets of verses from 1036.1 will be given with the verse number taken from 1036.3.

- [1] Adam comes first upon the Stage. And Eve from out his Side, Who was given to him in Marriage: Turn up, and see his Bride. [flap [2a] recto]
- [2] Here Eve in shape you may behold, One body sheweth Twain: Once more do but the Leaf downfold, And it's as strange again. [flap [2a] verso] [below 6 lines:

 Is soon turn'd into another Shape:
 Lift up, and see how strange. [flap [3a] recto]
- [5] A Griffin here you may behold,

 [10] Now I've got Gold & Silver Store, Bribes from the Rich, Pawns from the Poor, What worldly Cares can trouble me? Turn down the Leaf, and then you'll see. [flap [5a] recto]
- [11] Sickness is come, and Death draws nigh, Help Gold and Silver, ere I die; It will not do, for it's but Dross; Turn up and see Man's End at last. [flap [5b] verso] [above 8 lines:
 [20] Now Christ is come to set us free/...]

Textural differences between this edition and 1036.3: The verses are unnumbered; each 4 lines of verses [1-20] are separated by a space; flap [2a] recto, verse [1], "Stage,", line 1, followed by a comma; both

editions have a colon after "Marriage:", line 3; flap [2a] verso, verse [2], "Twain:", line 2, followed by a colon; flap [3b] verso, verse [18], "Face.", line 8, with a period; flap [4a] recto, verse [7], "Gold:", line 3, with a colon; flap [4a] verso, verse [9], "me.", line 4, followed by a period; flap [4b] verso, verse 6, "lye!", line 2, spelled with a "y"; flap [5b] verso, verse [11], "Dross:", line 3, with a colon; flap [5a] recto, verse [16], "eat,", line 7, with a comma; verse 12, "Man;", line 1, with a semicolon.

Fourteen printer's ornaments (pl. 1, figs. 20, 27, 72; pl. 4, figs. 85, 109, 121, 136, 137, 141, 143, 185; pl. 4a, figs. 198a, 198b, 219) are present. The borders around the verses are composed of ornaments as follows: flap [2a] recto, 4 of 141, rest 143; flap [2a] verso, 6 of 20, 2 of 185, remainder 198a, 198b, including the separating bar*; flap [2b] verso, entirely 141; flap [3a] recto, 2 of 137, remainder 136; flaps [3a], [3b] verso, 7 of 137, remainder 72; flap [4a] recto, 4 of 85, remainder 27; flap [4a] verso, 4 of 137, remainder 121; flap [4b] verso, 9 of 141, remainder 109, flap [5a] recto 4, of 85, rest 27; flap [5a] verso, 6 of 20, 6 of 20, 6 of 109, remainder 219; p. [6], verse [21], 6 of 137, 2 of 185, remainder 72.

The illustrations, on either the flaps, or pages, are enclosed by an outer thick and an inner thin rule border. The cuts were printed again and again. With the passage of time the rules became more and more nicked or broken. These particular illustrations are probably type metal cuts because some of the rules are bent, or have a curve in them. See plate 14, figures 4, 19. The presence or absence of certain rules or nicks in borders are of little value in dating these booklets, because they appear to a greater or lesser extent in all editions using the Poupard cuts. For instance, the top double rule border of the upper half of the cut of Adam, flap [2a] recto, is distinct in 1036.1 (pl. 14, fig. 1), and also in 1036.3. In 1036.2, 1036.3a, 1036.4a, 1036.5 the upper thick rule is absent or very faint, leaving the lower hair line rule at the top border. In 1036.4 the right half of the upper rule is distinct, the entire upper rule is almost completely intact in 1036.6, but weak again in 1036.7. Finally, in 1036.8, both rules are clear and strong. From this short series it can be seen that the presence or absence of the upper rule may be entirely due to how well the cut was inked at the time of printing. The cut of the mermaid p.[2], has a nick in the thick outer rule of the left border which appears in all editions, unless the cut is over inked. The right double rule border,

*From here on the separating bar will not be described unless it is composed of different ornaments from the borders around the verses. flap [2a] recto, does not show nicked area " a' " (pl. 14, fig. 3) in 1036.1, nor in 1036.3. In fact the border in 1036.3 is clearer than in 1036.1. In 1036.2 [ca. 1788], 1036.3a [ca. 1793] (pl. 14, fig. 3a), and later editions through 1036.25, 1819, nicked area " a' " is present. The top double rule border above the lion's nose, flap [3a] recto, shows a break designed "B" (pl. 14, fig. 6), which passes through both rules. The PP, Rosenbach copy, 1036.3, was at first considered the earliest edition, because of the absence of break "B" (pl. 14, fig. 6a), and also nicked area "a'". In the region where break "B" occurs in 1036.1, the double rules, in 1036.3, come together to form a single line. It is difficult to account for the absence of break "B" in 1036.3, because it occurs in all other editions having the Poupard plates. Possibly the absence of nicked area "a'" and break "B" in 1036.3 may be due to inking. In the illustration of the upper portion of the heart, flap [4a] recto, the end of the left double rule border is squared off (pl. 14, fig. 12) which is the same as in 1036.2. The left border of 1036.3 ends in point "c" slanting to the right, same as in 1036.3a (pl. 14, fig. 13). Point "c" also occurs in 1036.4-1036.7. The upper end of the right border, of the picture of the man, below the upper portion of the heart, flap [4b] recto, is straight (pl. 14, fig. 8) in 1036.1 and .2. In later editions, 1036.3-1036.10 (pl. 14, fig. 8a), the end of the right border has bend "c'" which curves to the left. The right double rule border of the lower portion of the large cut of the gentleman with the cane, flap [5b] recto, is without a break in 1036.1 (pl. 14, fig. 17). In 1036.3-1036.7 (pl. 14, fig. 18) the cut has nicked portion "d", below which break "D" occurs in 1036.13, 1036.16 (pl. 14, fig. 20). The lower part of the right border of the picture of the man dying in bed, p. [5], is without a break in 1036.1-1036.8. Starting with 1036.9, break "E" (pl. 14, fig. 21) is present and in all following editions with Poupard plates. I am of the opinion that 1036.1 is an earlier printing than 1036.3 because of the old spelling "lye" of the word "lie," the unnumbered verses, and the fact that the ruled borders are less defective, with the exception of nicked area "a'", and break "B."

Solomon Wieatt in his edition printed in 1807, 1036.6, employed the author's name "Benjamin Sands" on the title-page. The name "B. Sands" occurs on the bottom border of p. [5] in all editions using Poupard blocks. S. Wieatt printed two more editions of the booklet. Another in 1807, 1036.7, and one in 1810, 1036.8. In each of these the author's name is left off the title-page and does not appear in any other edition of the book. Since the name "B. Sands" appears on p. [5] in all Poupard illustrated editions, it is safe to assume he is the author. The book was rewritten from the English edition of *The*

Beginning and Progress of Man. London: E. Alsop, 1654, whose author is unknown.

The signature, "J. Poupard," appears at the base of all the illustrations except the one on p. [4]. These "Metamorphoses" were extremely popular and children made colored manuscript copies of them. There is a manuscript one with the inscription: "Designed by Katherine Fisher 18 years of age 1789. (Welch photostat MDeHi). Another manuscript Metamorphosis has "Drawn by Katherine Fisher Of Dedham June 23, 1797." (Welch photostat MDeHi). Both books are colored and have very similar designs. Weiss, 1932d, p. 106 describes two manuscript copies formerly in the collection of the late Wilbur Macey Stone. The first of these dated [1796] has only flaps [2a], [2b], [3a], [3b], ½ p. [4], flaps [5a], [5b], p. [5], 9 x 7.5 cm. (Welch). The second figured by Weiss 1932d, p. [115] is 9 x 14 cm. and is inscribed: "was made by hand by Laverina Anger of Fitzwilliam, N. H. in 1796." Another has on flap [4a] recto, or picture of the tip of a heart, the signature "Henry G. Jenks fec," written in old ink. Below it in pencil is the date "1790" (Welch xerox MWA). This appears to have been copied from an English edition of The Beginning and Progress of Man, rather than a copy with variations of an American one with Poupard illustrations, as are the preceding manuscript editions. An interesting manuscript copy is one surely taken from either a Philadelphia, J. Rakestraw edition, or one printed for Samuel Wood in New York. [1811–1820] (CLU). A fragment of another ms. one was surely copied from an edition with illustrations by Poupard. (Welch film MSaE).

James Poupard, according to Groce and Wallace, was in Philadelphia from 1769-1807. Hamilton quotes Stauffer as saying that Poupard's earliest engraving was mentioned in the Pennsylvania Gazette of June 29, 1774. The Pennsylvania Magazine, February 1775, Hamilton 76, contains a cut signed "J. P." probably James Poupard. There are eleven illustrations signed "J. Poupard" in Croxall's Fables Of Aesop And Others. Philadelphia: R. Aitken, 1777, no. 18.1. The date Rosenbach 82 gives 1036.3 is [1775]. This date has always seemed far too early to me. If 1036.3 were the first edition, it would have all the rule borders in perfect condition, which is not the case. It is also, in my judgement, later than 1036.1 for reasons mentioned above. Even 1036.1 has breaks in the borders. The earliest known dated edition is the MDeHi manuscript copy dated "1789." If that date is correct, then the printed edition possibly could have been printed several years before that date. On this assumption the conjectural date [ca. 1787] is assigned 1036.1. This at least allows sufficient time for the Poupard blocks to acquire the breaks which

appear in 1807, 1036.6. If the cuts had been used over a period of 32 years I would expect more and larger breaks.

English ed. & version entitled: The Beginning, Progress and End of Man. London: E. Alsop for T. Dunster, 1654. (Welch photostat MH). English ms. ed. lacking a title-page and copies from the above. English version of 1654. Each copy is different or has characteristic drawings. 17th century. (Welch photographic print reduced Muir); a copy dated 1776, 20 cm. (Welch photographic print, Muir); 18-19 century, 16.5 cm. (Welch photostat Ball); 19.5 cm. Welch xerox CaOTP); reduced copy (Welch photographic print, University of Reading, Museum of English Rural Life); a copy inscribed "A. A. Septr. 25th. 1802", 15.5 cm. It could have been copied in America from the above English book, but is more likely an English production. (PPL). The illustrations in the English ed. of 1654 and the ms. ones differ from the American ones. The pictures with flaps [2a, 2b-6a, 6b] turned down and up respectively show Adam, Cain, a lion, a man below the pointed base of a heart, and a man dressed in fine clothes holding a bag of money in each hand. Beneath these are five illustrations, p. [2-6]. When flaps [2a] and [2b] are turned up p. [2] first turns into Eve, and then into a mermaid. In like manner with the turning up or down of the flaps, Cain changes on p. [3] into Abel making a sacrifice, below which Cain is shown killing Abel. The lion changes on p. [4] into a griffin, and then into an eagle with a baby in its claws. When the lower flap [5b] recto is turned down a complete heart is formed with the lower part of the illustration on p. [5]. On lifting up flap [5a] recto the entire picture on p. [5] shows a bag filled with money. The well dressed man with bags of money in each hand changes on p. [6] into a skeleton when flaps [6a] and [6b] recto are turned up and down. There are only 15 sets of verses. Page [1] is blank as in the American edition 1036.1. The verses are:

- [1] Here Adam first leads up the Van, (True mirror of unstained life,) Till that he grew a married man: Turn up the leaf and see his wife. [flap [2a] recto]
- [2] Eve in her Virgin blush array'd, Her face more fair smiles are freer, But would you see a stranger Maid, Turn down the leaf and you shall see her. [top of p. [2]]
- [3] Eys, look not on this Mermaids face, And Ears, forbear her song: Her face hath an alluring grace, More charming is her tongue. [bottom of p. [2]]
- [4] Here Cain, the first of men by birth,

Cain brings the first-fruits of the Earth, Turn up, and see the other. [flap [3a] recto]

[5] Here Abel comes and brings to God The best and youngest of his Fold; But would you learn his period Turn down the leaf and it behold. [top of p. [3]]

Brings offerings with his Brother.

- [6] Accursed Cain! what dost thou do? Must Brothers murther thus begin? And one man die ere more than two As yet were born to mourn thy sin? [bottom of p. [3]]
- [7] The Lion rous'd, his floting Main In curls displays his fired brest; He rampant breaths forth high distain Lift up, and see a stranger Beast. [flap [4a] recto]
- [8] The Griffins head and wings unto The Lions back and legs are joyn'd: Turn down the lower leaf, and you A new and stranger sight shall find. [top of p. [4]]
- [9] An Eagle here with wings display'd, Doth gripe (alas) a lovely prey: Why is there help so long delay'd To rescue this sweet Babe away? [bottom of p. [4]]
- [10] But see what Providence hath done, The Child is safe, the Eagle's flown: His heart now after Gold doth run, Turn down and see where there is shown. [flap [5a] recto]
- [11] A Heart turn'd up-side-down and wholly Fixt on this world's unconstant wealth; Sick of a greedy melancholy: Turn up and find its way to health. [bottom of p. [5]]

It is interesting to note that the American edition dropped out the illustrations on flaps [3a, 3b] and p. [3] and verses [4]–[6] but added verses 13-20 each in eight lines, and verse 21 in twelve lines.

Typographical characteristics, comparing 1036.2 with 1036.3a, are: flap [2a] recto, verse [I], a period after "Seit.", line 2; a comma after "wars,", line 3; flap [2a] verso, verse [13], "gewand.t", line 4, with ".t" instead of "'t".; flap [2b] verso, verse [3], "reizende,", line 3, spelled without a "t"; flap [3b] verso, verse [18], "Erkänntnitz", line 2, has 2 "ns"; flap [4b] verso, verse [8], no comma after "gedrückt", line 1; flap [5a] recto, verse [10], "Welch weltlich", line 3; in 2 words; flap [5a] verso, verse [12], no comma after "Zeit", line 3; p. [6], verse [21], an exclamation mark after "verhüten!", line 4, spelled with I "t".

Sixteen printer's ornaments (pl. 1, figs. 20, 27, 72; pl. 4, figs. 85, 89, 109, 121, 136, 137, 141, 143, 185; pl. 4a, figs. 198a, 219, 236, 237) are present. The borders around the verses which somewhat resemble those in 1036.1 are: flap [2a] recto, has the top border with the formula I of 141/11 of 143/1 of 237/11 of 143/1 of 141; basal border, 1 of 141/ 11 of 143/1 of 237/3 of 143 with the curved lines horizontal/1 of 143 with the curved lines perpendicular/7 of 143 with the curved lines horizontal/1 of 141; the right and left borders each have 5 of 143 with the curved lines perpendicular; flap [2a] verso, same as 1036.1, with 6 of 20, rest 198a, only 185 is placed in the center of the top and basal borders instead of the center of the right and left borders of verse [2]; flap [2b] verso, I of 89, remainder 141, similar to 1036.1, which is entirely 141; flap [3a] wanting; flap [4a] recto, 4 of 85, 1 of 237 in the middle of the top border and I of 236 in the middle of the basal border, remainder 27; flap [5a] recto, same as flap [4a] recto, except the top border has I of 236 in the center, and the bottom one. 1 of 237, both flaps vary from 1036.1 in having ornaments 236 and 237; flap [4a] verso, 6 of 143, remainder 121, differing from 1036.1, which is entirely 137; flap [4b] verso, 7 of 136, remainder 109, differing from

1036.1, which has 8 of 141; p. [6], 4 of 137, remainder 72, with 2 of 79, differing from 1036.1, which has 6 of 137 and 2 of 185.

Entirely different borders are: flap [3b] verso, 6 of 141, 2 of 185, remainder 219; flap [5a] verso, 7 of 137, 1 of 136, 3 of 79, remainder 72; flap [5b] verso, 8 of 137, 3 of 79, remainder 72.

The illustrations are printed from the same blocks used in 1036.1 and show the same breaks and imperfections in the rule borders. From the above data, including the fact that the verses are unnumbered, I believe that the book was printed close to 1036.1. For this reason the conjectural date [*ca.* 1788] is being given to 1036.2. I am indebted to Ludwig Ries for first pointing out to me most of the above German textual differences between 1036.2 and 1036.3a. Welch & MWA xerox Ries* (flap [3a] wanting).

The type setting is similar to 1036.1 but shows variations: flap [2a] recto, verse 1, a period after "Stage.", line 1; flap [3a] recto, verse 4, no period after "Den", line 1, "range", line 2; flap [3b] verso, verse 6, "lie!", line 2, spelled with an "i"; verse 18, "Face?", line 3, followed by a question mark; flap [4a] recto, verse 7, "Gold.", line 5, not followed by a period; flap [4a] verso, verse 10, "Gold and Silver", line 1, with "and" spelled out; flap [5a] verso, verse 16, "eat;", line 7, followed by a semicolon; "God", line 8, instead of "Gods".

Eighteen printer's ornaments (pl. 1, figs. 3, 20, 27, 72, 79; pl. 4, figs. 105, 109, 137, 141, 143, 185; pl. 4a, figs. 198a, 198b, 216, 217, 219, 222) are present. The decorative borders on the flaps are: flap [2a-5a] recto, 2 of 143, 4 of 137, remainder 72; flap [2a] verso, 12 of 79, 5 of 20, 1 unfigured ornament, rest 198a, 198b; flap [2b] verso, entirely 216; flap [3a] verso, 6 of 141, remainder 219; flap [3b] verso, entirely 3; flap [4a] verso, 2 of 136, 2 of 137, 3 of 121, remainder 27; flap [4b] verso, 4 of 185, remainder 217; flap [5a] verso, 4 of 105, 1 of 89, 3 colons ":", remainder 141; flap [5b] verso, 4 of 143, remainder 109; p. [6], 20 of 72, 16 of 137, 6 of 143, 2 of 222.

The illustrations are printed from the Poupard blocks used in 1036.1. The borders around the cuts are clear and distinct. Break "B" (pl. 14, fig. 6), flap [3a] recto, in the top border above the lion's head in 1036.1, is present in all editions with Poupard plates except 1036.3 (pl. 14, fig. 6a). The double rules in 1036.3, in the region where break "B" normally occurs, come together and form a single line. The

absence of this break is possibly due to the way the block was inked at the time of printing or some other unknown factor. Nick "b'" (pl. 14, fig. 10) appears for the first time on flap [3a] recto, in the inner rule of the right double rule border, 10.5 mm. from the base. The blocks, as stated before, were probably type metal, because bends in the borders can be noted. The tip of the right border of the cut on flap [4b] recto, has bend "c'" (pl. 14, fig. 8a). Bend "c'" is found in all later editions. In 1036.1 (pl. 14, fig. 8) and 1036.2 bend "c' " is absent. The end of the left border of the illustration, flap [4a] recto, ends in point "c" similar to 1036.3a (pl. 14, fig. 13), instead of being squared off as in 1036.1 (pl. 14, fig. 12) and 1036.2. But the most characteristic variation is seen in the left double rule border of flap [5b] recto (pl. 14, fig. 18), where break "d" occurs in the outer thick rule, 20.7 mm. from the upper end. In 1036.1 (pl. 14, fig. 19) and 1036.2 the outer rule is without a break. From these data on the imperfections in the ruled borders, in conjunction with the newer spelling of the word "lie", flap [3b] verso, instead of "lye", and the fact that the verses are numbered for the first time, I believe that 1036.3 was printed later than 1036.1 and 1036.2. The conjectural date [ca. 1792] is being given the book.

Welch photostat PP*; Bristol p. 400 dated [1788:] the date I first assigned the book; Rosenbach 82, dated [1775].

See 1036.1 for a description of the format of this booklet. The text differs from 1036.2 by having on flap [2a] recto verse I, no period after "Seit", line 2; no comma after "wars", line 3; flap [2b] verso, verse [3], "reitzende", line 3 spelled "tz"; flap [3b] verso, verse 18, "Erkäntnitz", line 2, with one "n"; flap [4b], verse 8, a comma after "gedruckt,", line 1; flap [5a] recto, verse 10, "Welchweltlich", line 3, in one word; flap [5a] verso, verse 12, a comma after "Zeit,", line 3; p. [6], verse 21, "verhutten", line 4, not followed by an exclamation point, and spelled with two "ts".

Twelve printer's type ornaments (pl. 1, figs. 20, 72, 79; pl. 4, figs. 109, 136, 137, 138, 141, 143, 185; pl. 4a, figs. 219, 236) are present. The ornaments around the verses are as follows: flap [2a] recto, top border with the formula, I of 141/8 of 143/1 of 236/13 of 143/1 of 141; basal border I of 141/11 of 143/1 of 236/10 of 143 with all the curved lines horizontal, the right and left borders each have 5 of 143; flaps [2a-5a] verso, have 6 of 20, 14 of 79; flap [2b] verso, 3 of 143; remainder 141; flaps [3a-5a] recto, 4 of 137, remainder 136; flap [3b] verso, 3 of

[Oct.,

109, remainder 141; flap [4b] verso, 6 of 141, 2 of 185, remainder 219, flap [5b] verso, 6 of 138, remainder 109; p. [6], 4 of 137, 2 of 237, remainder 72. The borders on flaps [2a], [3a] recto and p. [6] resemble those in 1036.1, 1036.2. Those on flaps [2a] verso, are the same as in 1036.3.

The illustrations are printed from the Poupard blocks used in 1036.3 and show all the imperfections in the rule borders described in that edition. In addition nicked area "a'" (pl. 14, fig. 3a) appears for the first time in the right rule border, of the cut of Adam, flap [2a] recto. This edition is believed to have been printed later than 1036.3 because of the presence of nicked area "a'". The characteristic that links it to 1036.3 is the use of Roman numeral "I" for verse "I". All later editions have the "I" printed with an Arabic numeral. The booklet is dated [ca. 1795].

The text shows variations in type setting when compared with 1036.3. Flap [2a] recto, verse 1, "Marriage?", line 3, is followed by a question mark instead of a colon and is similar to 1036.3a; flap [2a] verso, verse 2, "Body", line 2, has a capital "B", instead of "b"; flap [4a] recto, verse 7, "Gold;", line 3, is followed by a semicolon instead of a period; flap [4a] verso, verse 9, "me!", line 4, has an exclamation mark instead of a question mark; flap [4b] verso, verse 8, "oppress'd", line I, has the first "s" printed in the old form "s" and the second one in the modern form of the letter; verse 19, "Head,", line 6, followed by a comma instead of a period; "bride", line 7, has a lower case "b" instead of "B"; flap [5b] verso, verse 20, "love.", line 4, with a lower case "l" instead of "L"; "Propos'd", line 7 and "purchas'd", line 8, both have the modern form of the letter "s" instead of the old form.

Six printer's type ornaments (pl. 1, fig. 79; pl. 4, figs. 150, 178; pl. 4a, figs. 198a, 228, 230) are present. The borders around the verses have ornaments as follows: flaps [2a-5a] recto, have 2 sets of 2 dots "...", variously placed in the side borders, remainder 228; flaps [2a-4a] verso, [2b-4b] verso have 6 of 230, 14 of 79, remainder 198a; flaps [5a], [5b] verso have 6 of 230, 28 of 150, remainder 198a; p. [6], 4 of 230, remainder 178. The lines of the 198a borders on the verso of all the flaps, with usually ornament 79 or 150 at each end, and which lie within corner ornament 230, are characteristically separated with

colons and have special formulas by themselves. A few of these, by way of example, are: flap [2a] verso, top border, has 2 of 198a/a colon ":"/6 of 198a/a colon ":"/1 of 198a; separating bar, I of 198a/a colon ":"/7 of 198a/a colon ":"/1 of 198a; basal border, 4 of 198a/ a colon ":"/1 of 198a/a colon ":"/4 of 198a; flap [2b] verso, top border, I of 198a/possibly a colon printed with defective type/6 of 198a/ a colon ":"/2 of 198a; separating bar [same as in flap [2a] verso]; basal border, 9 of 198a, without colons [the left fourth of the border however is bled]; flap [3a] verso, top border, a colon ":"/6 of 198a/a colon ":"/2 of 198a; basal border, 2 of 198a/a colon ":"/6 of 198a/a colon ":"/1 of 198a. In like manner the other 198a blocks are variously separated with usually two colons per border, although some have only one, or the colon may be absent.

The illustrations are printed from the Poupard blocks and the borders have imperfections a', B, b', c, c', d, described in 1036.3a. On flap [2a] recto new nick "bb" (pl. 14, fig. 7) occurs in the thick outer rule of the left border, 22.8 mm. from the top. This edition is probably later than 1036.3 and 1036.3a because the modern form of the letter "s" is used in three words, where the old form of the letter was present in 1036.3; new nick "bb" appears on flap [2a] recto; Arabic numeral "1" numbers the first verse and does so in all later editions; newer ornament 230 replaces 20, and is found in subsequent editions. The conjectural date [ca. 1796-1801] has been assigned to this book. Welch photostat NjP*; Hamilton 1168.(2).

1036.4a [—] [—— Philadelphia, ca. 1802]

p.[2] including flaps [2a-2b] only; illus.; 14.5 cm.; verse "1" numbered with an Arabic number. See 1036.1 for a description of the format of this booklet. The text has the same type-setting, punctuation, capitalization and spelling as 1036.4. The borders of printer's type ornaments show variations, with new type ornament 227 appearing for the first time. Seven type ornaments (pl. 1, fig. 79; pl. 4, fig. 150; pl. 4a, figs. 198a, 198b, 227, 228, 230) are present. Flap [2a] recto, is similar to 1036.4 and has 2 sets of dots "..." in the side borders, the remainder 228, with the left border from top to bottom having the formula 5 of 230/I set of dots "..."/I of 230, the same as in 1036.4; the right side border has, 4 of 230/I set of dots "..."/2 of 230, the reverse of 1036.4, which has 2 of 230/1 set of 2 dots "..."/4 of 230. Flap [2a] verso, has 14 of 79, 4 of 230, one in each corner, 2 of 227, 2 colons ":", the remainder 198a, 198b. These borders inside of the 4 corner ornaments of 230 have the following formulas: flap [2a] verso, top border I of 79/9 of 198a/a colon ":"/I of 79; separating bar, I of 79/9 of 198a, with the sixth slightly below the level of the rest of the bar/a short dash "--"/I of 79; basal border, I of 79/7 of 198a, with the second and sixth slightly above the remainder of the bar/4 of 198b/a colon ":"/I of 79; both side borders between the corner ornaments, from top to bottom, are I of 79/3 of 198a/I of 79/I of 227/I of 79/I of 198b/I of 79. Flap [2b] verso, 10 of 79, 2 of 150, 2 of 227, 5 colons ":", 4 of 230, one in each corner, remainder 198a, 198b. The borders within corner ornaments 230 and the side borders have these formulas: flap [2b] verso, top border I of 79/I colon ":"/I of 150/I 6 198b/I of 198a/3 of 198a/2 of 198b/I of 198a/I colon ":"/2 of 198b/I of 198a/3 of 198b/4 of 198a/2 of 198b/I of 198a/I colon ":"/I of 79; basal border, I of 79/I colon ":"/I 8 of 198b/I of 79; each side border between the corner ornaments has I of 79/2 of 198b/I of 227/8 of 198b/I of 79.

The Poupard cuts have the same imperfections noted in 1036.4. Since the type setting of the text is the same as 1036.4, with the old form of the letter "s" at the beginning of words still in use; the border ornaments similar, but having variations, and the borders around the cuts having no new imperfections, 1036.4a was probably printed sometime near 1036.4 and is dated [ca. 1802].

Flap [2a] recto, verse I, "Marriage:", line 3, followed by a colon; "see", line 4, spelled with the modern form of the letter "s" and so are all words throughout the text starting with a lower case "s", or having the letter somewhere in the word; flap [2b] verso, verse 17, "Righteousness,", line 4, followed by a comma; flap [3b] verso, verse 6, "prepared", line 4, instead of "prepar'd"; flap [4b] verso, verse 19, "Bride,", line 7, with a capital "B"; flap [5b] verso, verse 20, "God,", line 7, followed by a comma.

Seven printer's type ornaments (pl. 1, figs. 27, 79; pl. 4, figs. 120, 153; pl. 4a, figs. 198a, 230, 232) are present. The borders around the verses have ornaments as follows: flaps [2a-4a] recto, 4 of 232, 4 of 120, remainder 153; flaps [2a-3a] verso, 6 of 120, 14 of 79, remainder 198a with 8 colons ":", six of these are placed at either end of the horizontal bars of 198a, the other two are in the side borders, one colon in each, at the top, below ornament 79; flaps [4a-5a], [4b] verso, 6 of 230, 14 of 79, 8 colons ":", remainder 198a; flaps [5a], [5b] verso,

6 of 230, 14 of 79, a set of four dots "::" in each side border, remainder 198a; flap [5a] recto, 2 of 232, remainder 120; p. [6], 3 of corner ornament 120, the 4th worn away, remainder 27. The illustrations printed from the Poupard blocks show no new breaks or bends not found in 1036.4. Since the modern form of the letter "s" is used throughout, the booklet was possibly printed [ca. 1803-1804].

[2-6] p.; illus.; 14.5 cm.; verses I-2I numbered in Arabic numerals. See 1036.I for a description of the format of this booklet. The modern form of the letter "s" is used throughout and in all later editions. The text shows variations from 1036.5. Flap [2a] recto, verse I, "side," line 2, has a lower case "s"; flap [3a] recto, verse 4, "shape:", line 3, with a lower case "s"; flap [3b] verso, verse 6, "prepar'd", line 4, spelled "d"; flap [4a] verso, verse 9, "Silver-store", line I, with the "s" of "store" in the lower case; the following words all have the first letter in the lower case: flap [5a] recto, verse 10, "store", line I; flap [5a] verso, verse 16, "voice,", line I, "choice,", line 2, verse 12, "dust;", line I, "death", line 4; flap [5b] verso, verse 11, "end", line 4, verse 20, "view", line 5, "eternal", line 7, "blood", line 8; p. [6], verse 21, "space", line 5, "length", line 6, "span", line 6, "space", line 9, "eternity", line 10, "time", line 12, all have the first letter of each word in the lower case.

Nine printer's ornaments (pl. 1, figs. 17, 61; pl. 4, figs. 115, 127, 143, 153, 154, 160; pl. 4a, fig. 230) are present. The borders around the verses have the following ornaments: flap [2a-4a] recto, 4 of 154, 4 of 160, one in each corner, remainder 17; flap [5a] recto, 4 of 153, 2 sets of two dots "...", 4 of 160, one in each corner, remainder 127, with the separating bar having 25 of 115; flaps [2b-5b] verso, same as preceding borders but with a separating bar composed of ornament 61; p. [6], 4 of 230, one in each corner, remainder 143. The borders show the first radical change in the use of ornaments. No longer do ornaments 79, and 198 form the characteristic border of many of the verses. Ornament 127, used by S. Wieatt in 1807, 1036.6, on his title-page, and on the recto of flaps, is generously employed on the verso of the flaps in 1036.5a.

The Poupard blocks show new breaks "A" and "B'" for the first time. Break "A" (pl. 14, fig. 2), 3.7 mm. long, passes through both rules of the left border of picture of the upper half of Adam, flap [2a] recto. Plate 14, figure 1, shows this border in 1036.1. Break "B'"

[Oct.,

(pl. 14, fig. 11), 1.8 mm. long, bisects both rules of the right border of the cut of the upper half of the lion, flap [3a] recto. Both breaks "A" and "B' " occur in 1036.6 and later editions. By means of them, along with the use of ornament 127, this book is dated prior to 1807 or [ca. 1805–1806].

The type setting is close to 1036.5a with relatively few differences. Flap [2a] recto, verse I, "Marriage;", line 3, is followed by a semicolon; flap [2b] verso, "grace," line 3, has a lower case "g"; flap [5a] verso, verse 16, "fruit", line 7, a lower case "f", "Good", line 8, a capital "G"; p. [6], verse 21, "life", line 7, a lower case "l".

Eight printer's type ornaments (pl. 4, figs. 123, 127, 130, 157, 160, 187; pl. 4a, figs. 215, 230) are present. The title-page has a border of ornament 127 with 230 in each corner. Ornament 230 is a variant of figure 20, plate I and first appears in 1036.4. Above and below the author's name, is ornament 215. The verses are bordered with ornaments. Flaps [2a-5a] recto, have 4 of 130, remainder 127; the rest of the flaps and their verses are bordered with 123 with 157 in each corner except flap [2b] verso, which has 160 in one corner and 123 in the other three; flap [3a] verso, has 160 in three corners and 123 in one; flap [5a] verso, has 187 in all four corners, 20 of 160, 34 of 123. There is a dot "." in the center of the top and basal borders on flaps [2a], [5a], [2b-5b] verso, and p. [6]. Page [6] varies by also having a dot "." below each top corner ornament 157 and above each basal corner ornament 157; flap [3a] verso has a similar top border with a central dot, but the basal one has the dot between the end of a row of 16 of 123 and right corner ornament 160; flap [4a] verso has no central dots in either top or basal borders but has I dot "." below the left top corner ornament 157, and two dots "." one to the left and another below right top corner ornament 157. On all the verso flaps the separating bars are entirely 127, which on flap [2a] verso, differs in having a central dot "." and on flap [2b] verso, a dot "." 10 mm. from the left border.

The illustrations printed from the Poupard blocks show the same imperfections shown in 1036.5a including breaks "A" and "B'". New break "cc" is the same as in 1036.9 (pl. 14, fig. 15). It is 3.6 mm. long and appears in the outer thick rule of the left border of the cut showing the upper portion of heart, flap [4a] recto, 22 mm. from the top of the illustration.

The Poupard blocks with imperfections A, B, B', bb, c, c', cc, are the same as in 1036.6, but bends "aa", "dd" and break "A' " appear for the first time. Bend "aa" (pl. 14, fig. 4) curves concavely to the left and is in the right double rule border near the top right corner of the cut showing the upper half of Adam, flap [2a] recto. From the lower end of the same right border, break "A' " (pl. 14, fig. 4) shortens the tip end 4 mm. Bend "dd" (pl. 14, fig. 19) is in the lower part of the right double rule border of the illustration of the bottom half of the gentleman with the cane, flap [5b] recto. It is also a left concave curve, and is just below nicked portion "d" (pl. 14, fig. 18), which first appeared in 1036.3. Three new illustrations are used. The title vignette signed "MICAH, C^h, IV. 4." shows a man reading a book under a tree. That on p. [7] depicts a man seated in a chair and handing a boy a book. The picture on p. [8] portrays a woman in chains in a prison. It was used for a frontispiece, to portray Maria Martin, in The History Of The Captivity and Sufferings Of Maria Martin. The sides have central ornament 199a. Flaps [2a-5a] recto, verses 1, 7, 4, 10 respectively with verses 7 and 4 printed on the wrong flaps, are bordered with a combination of 118 and 201a, and 4 of corner 118 alone. The basal border on flap [2b] verso has the third one, of ornament 123, from the right, printed on the side. Those on flaps [2a-3a] verso have 123 with 229 in each corner. At the top of p. [2-3] there are 8 of 164, and at the bottom of the same pages are 8 of 166. The separating bars on the verso of the flaps are entirely 150.

The text and illustrations are probably copies of the Poupard ones in 1036.13 or some earlier Philadelphia edition. The title vignette, of an angel or cherub seated on clouds and holding a table, is new. The cut of the three-masted schooner, flying the American flag, appears in this edition, p. [8], and resembles the one later used by Joseph Rake-straw in his Philadelphia edition printed for New-York publisher Samuel Wood in 1814, 1036.16. The blocks were used with new border ornaments around the title-page and flaps in an edition "Published by Wm. Hazen & Co., Pottersville, Hunterdon Co., N.J. 1875." (Welch gift of B. Tighe). The cuts present on the missing pages and flaps in 1036.12 are present in this edition and were probably the ones used by Pelsue and Gould in 1813.

Two new oval illustrations appear for the first time in a Philadelphia edition. They were copied in 1036.11. The one on p. [7] shows a man seated with his back to a small hill and facing a horse. On top of the hill is a tree with a long overhanging branch. The illustration on p. [8] includes a man and woman standing in front of a haystack with trees in the background.

*Joseph Rakestraw in 1814 printed a series of different editions which at first glance look alike. But he varied the imprint on the title-page, and changed the corner ornaments. Some corner ornaments were printed without dots, others had I or 2 dots "." added. The dots may be placed above, below, to the right or left of the corner ornament. For example, I dot above or below ornament 157, 2 dots to the right of 157, etc. To locate each corner precisely, right is abbreviated to "R", left to "L", top border to "t", basal border to "b", corner to "C". By combining these, "LtC" stands for left top corner; "RbC" right basal corner, etc.
RtC/2 dots above 167, LbC, RbC. The middle border has short lengths of a double rule. The inner border is 128 with 146 in each corner without dots. All the flaps and p. [6] have borders of 123 with varying corner ornaments. Flaps [2a], [5a] recto, have I dot below 157, LtC/I dot above 157, LbC, RbC/I dot at an angle to 157 between the side borders, RtC; flaps [3a-4a] recto, I dot below 157, LtC, RtC, I dot above 157, LbC, RbC; flaps [2a], [4a-5a], [5b] verso, no dots with 157; flap [3b] verso, no dots with 157, LtC, RtC/2 dots above 157, LbC, RbC; flap [4b] verso 2 dots below 157, LtC, RtC/no dots with 157, LbC, RbC; flap [2b], [3a] verso, no dots with 160; p. The Poupard illustrations show the following defects. Nick "bb" (pl. 14, fig. 7), in the outer thick rule of the left border, in the cut of the lion's head, flap [3a] recto, is no longer obvious. Instead break "BB" (pl. 14, fig. 7a), has occurred through both rules. It is however so fine that it usually fills up with ink during printing and looks like a single line. So break "BB" in this and later editions usually does not have a space across the rules. In the right double rule border of the cut of the upper portion of the heart, flap [4a] recto, below the break "cc", through the outer thick rule border, new bend "ccc" (pl. 14, fig. 16) is now found. The title vignette shows a column of stone with an urn on top of it. On the side of the column is a carved face with a stream of water coming out of the mouth, and falling into a round bowl in front of the column. Behind the column are shrubs. The cut of the three-masted schooner, p. [8] appears for the first time in a Philadelphia, J. Rakestraw edition.

Since no copy of 1169.1 has been located it is a matter of conjecture what the text was. Another possibility is that the text was the same as *Tom Thumb's Play Book* with the title-page changed. No. 1171.8 is a fragmentary copy of a book listed as *Tom Thumb's Play Book* which is lacking the title-page. It may actually be a Samuel Hall edition of *Tom Thumb's Little Book*.

The date at a glance could be taken for 1761 or 1762 but it appears to me to be 1764. Rosenbach, Halsey, and Opie mention this apprentice's token of Isaiah Thomas and date it 1761. The late Mr. Frederick Melcher's facsimile reproduction of the book dates it about 1760. Mr. Frederick Goff, Chief of the Rare Book Room of the Library Of Congress on comparing the Melcher facsimile with the DLC copy of the Boston: Kneeland and Adams, 1771 edition, no. 1171.4, noted that p. 5-30 are identical in both books and considered the date [ca. 1760] for the Barclay edition open to question and believed the date should be [ca. 1771]. Mr. Goff is quite right; p. 5-30 are identical in both books. The 1771 edition has these pages printed from standing type. Page 4 in the 1771 edition has an extra line "L l Long'd for it," and in the following line "Mourn'd" is spelled with an "d" instead of "Mourned" in the earlier edition. The omission of a line on this page and also on p. 31 in the Barclay edition, could easily have been done by an apprentice. It must be noted, however, that in the case of the omission on p. 4, it is possible that the original book from which Thomas copied the book may have lacked it also, because the Edinburgh [ca. 1786] ed. also wants this line. The words wanting in the Barclay edition p. 31 are: "forgive us our trespasses as we". These have been added to p. 31 in the 1771 edition and appear on the first three lines. The remaining four lines on p. 31 are printed from standing type. Page 3 and [32] of 1171.1 are not present in the

1771 edition. Instead there is a frontispiece, p.[2], which seems to be made up of portions of p.[32] and p.[3] of 1171.1. The decorative bar at the top of the frontispiece consists of 9 of 7 and matches the lower bar on p.[32], of 1171.1. The next six lines match the same six lines in 1171.1 p.[3]. This is followed by 4 new lines: "Great Letters./ [3 lines of the upper case of the alphabet], below which is the same decorative bar consisting of 10 of 13 used on p.[3] of 1771.1 in the middle of the page. The similarity of the Barclay edition to the Kneeland and Adams 1771 edition does not change my belief in Isaiah Thomas' written statement. Mr. John Wyllie, Librarian of the University of Virginia was kind enough to examine xerox prints of mine of the Kneeland and Adams edition and the facsimile of the Barclay edition and is of the same opinion. Early American printers reprinted books from standing type. The example that comes to my mind is The History Of The Holy Jesus. Boston 1748, no. 532.4 which is mostly printed from standing type of the 1747 edition, no. 532.3. The two books can be told apart by a few corrections and changes on certain pages and breaks in the borders of cuts. The 1749 edition, 532.5 is again printed from standing type so that it is extremely difficult to tell the text of it from the 1748 edition although variations occur which are mainly characteristic breaks in the borders of cuts.

Tom Thumb's Play Book contains the famous alphabet rhyme "A. was an Archer and shot a frog." This verse and "D. was a drunkard, and had a red face," first appeared in England in A Little Book For Children: Wherein are set down, in a plain and pleasant way, Directions for Spelling, and other remarkable matters. Adorned with cuts. By T. W. London, Printed for G. C. and sold at the Ring in Little-Britain. [n.d.] (Welch xerox BM). The British Museum dates this book [1702] possibly because it is bound with another book entitled: A Little Book For Little Children. . . . By Thomas White, London, 1702. (Welch xerox BM), which is a totally different book. The Opies and Muir date the book by "T.W." [ca. 1712]. Muir states that the British Museum date is "implausible as the book advertises Ronksley" "The Child's Weeks-work" published in 1712.

The next appearance of "A was an Archer" is in *The Child's new Play*thing, 2 ed. 1743, no. 188.1. The rhyming alphabet except for the letters A and D is entirely rewritten and is the version used in all editions of *Tom Thumb's Play-Book*. *The Child's new Play-thing* also contains another equally famous rhyme "A Apple Pye, B bit it, ..." which is in all editions of Tom Thumb's Play-Book.

This last book has the same format in size, type of paper used for the cover and the identical wording of the advertisement caption on the back cover as 1246a. The advertisement caption of 1246a differs only in having certain words capitalized. In Scripture Questions "Watt's Divine Songs" is advertised for sale at \$2,50 per hun." but is omitted in 1246a. In Clowes' The Gooseberry Bush And Caterpillars, no. 202, Lincoln and Edmands used the same shade of brick red colored paper for the covers in 1818. This book was also advertised in 1246a and in Scripture Questions. Only one edition of no. 202 is known. Because of these data the book is dated [ca. 1819]. It could not have been printed earlier than 1818, but its type ornaments and the advertisements seem to favor the later date 1819.

The book is a gruesome compilation containing some of the most harrowing stories taken from Foxe's *Book Of Martyrs*. The account of the mother and the seven martyred sons is a grisly one. Books such as this one and Janeway's *Token For Children* were considered suitable literature intended to bring joy to the youth of their day.

He actually was the third son of Sir William Whittington, lord of the manor of Pauntley, in Gloucestershire, who died in 1360. The son became enormously rich after having been sent to London to learn to be a merchant and became mayor of London in 1397, 1406, and 1419. "He rebuilt Newgate, founded a library in Guildhall, and the Grey Friars, repaired St. Bartholomew's Hospital, and materially contributed towards the rebuilding of the nave of Westminster Abbey." (Ashton p. 380). How the cat got into the story nobody seems to know. Some say that Whittington made his money by carrying coals in vessels called cats or "cattes". Another theory is that he made his money by "achats" the French word for trading. See Ashton, p. 380-381, for a discussion on this matter.
