An Inventory of a United States Army Field Printing Office, 1865

B_{ECAUSE} of the scarcity of records, students of American printing are eager for factual data concerning the business affairs of a printing office. The following document is particularly interesting, because it throws light into a dark corner of the history of the craft. Edwin H. Carpenter, Jr., published an article on 'Army Field Printing in the New World' in *The Papers of the Bibliographical Society of America*, volume fifty, second quarter (1956) pp. 169-180. Apparently, he had not been able to locate definite information about the equipment found in a field printing office. The document printed below was given to the American Antiquarian Society by Grosvernor M. Crooks of Lexington, Massachusetts. It makes an interesting footnote to Mr. Carpenter's article.
