NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

(Arising from recorded cash transactions) Year ended August 31, 1971

Note A

The accounts are maintained on a cash basis and accordingly, uncollected subscriptions amounting to approximately \$314,000 at August 31, 1971 are not reflected in the financial statements. Cash received from the subscriptions will be used for the addition to the building now under construction. The total cost of the project is expected to be approximately \$1,000,000.

Note B

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost or the appraised amount at the date of the gift.

Depreciation of the building is computed using the declining balance method based on a useful life of 50 years. Substantially all of the equipment is depreciated using the straight line method based on a useful life of 20 years.

STATEMENT BY THE TREASURER

During the year ended August 31, 1971, the Society received gifts for current use of \$17,514, an increase of approximately \$1,300 over the year before. The pattern of current donations has varied considerably from year to year, influenced recently by our Development Program. The amount received this past year was almost exactly the same as in 1966 but—I can assure you—does not buy as much fuel oil, electricity, etc. for the Society as did the 1966 dollars.

Invested funds of the Society on August 31, 1971 had a book value of 33,886,000 and a market value of 44,173,000 (of which 69% was in equity investments). This market value was 859,000 greater than a year ago.

Income from investments was \$174,397, an increase of \$15,442 over the year before representing a return of 4.2% on the market value of the securities.

During the year, approximately \$406,000 was received from bequests and donations for addition to the principal funds of the Society. Included in this amount was approximately \$245,000 from the estate of John Thomas Lee.

Some portion of the funds raised in connection with the Development Program will be withdrawn from invested funds this year and applied to the cost of the changes underway at the Library.

Since May, 1969, the Society has employed FMR Investment Management Service, Inc. as investment advisor. The Finance Committee meets quarterly with the individuals who handle our account and is satisfied with the results of this arrangement to date.

We have examined the accompanying statement of assets and fund balances arising from recorded cash transactions of the American Antiquarian Society as of August 31, 1971 and the related statements of income and expenses and changes in fund balances for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

It is not practicable in non-profit organizations to establish accounting control over cash received prior to recording it. Accordingly, our examination of cash receipts was limited to recorded transactions. Furthermore we did not obtain confirmation of the uncollected subscriptions from contributors (Note A).

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the assets and fund balances arising from recorded cash transactions of the American Antiquarian Society at August 31, 1971, and the income and expenses and changes in fund balances for the year then ended on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

In connection with our examination of the financial statements, we have also examined the statement of cash receipts and expenditures for the year ended August 31, 1971. In our opinion, such information presents fairly the recorded cash receipts and disbursements although it is not necessary for a fair presentation of financial position or results of operations.
