 O_N August 31, 1981, the market value of the invested funds of the Society was \$5,427,422 compared to \$5,686,277 at the end of the preceding fiscal year. The carrying value of these stocks and bonds on August 31, 1981, was \$5,662,793 whereas a year ago it stood at \$4,929,421.

During the past year our portfolio performed only moderately well because of the depressed state of the stock market. Generally, however, the portfolio did as well, or as poorly, as the Dow Jones and Standard & Poor indices. We experienced a net trading gain of \$740,887. Sixty-five percent of the portfolio was invested in equities a year ago and sixty-nine percent at August 31, 1981. The remainder was in fixed-income securities. The yield on our investments was approximately eight percent.

Support and revenue to the Society from all sources for the year ended August 31, 1981, amounted to \$1,218,365 whereas expenses were \$1,106,100, resulting in a gain of \$112,255. In addition, gifts to the endowment funds of the Society for the year amounted to \$453,223, and gifts for equipment were used to purchase same at a cost of \$29,175. Gifts from members and friends for the annual budgeted expenses of the Society totaled \$121,232.

Bequests were received from the estates of Alice C. Brigham, Nathaniel Wheeler, and Mary Gage Rice. Substantial pledges were obtained for the Isaiah Thomas Fund amounting to \$1,000,000 received from two foundations prior to August 31, 1981, and a pledge of \$500,000, received subsequent to that date.

The investment portfolio of the Society continues to be satisfactorily managed by FMR Investment Management Services, Inc. At the urging of our finance committee, FMR has made a substantial shift in investment policy by concentrating on securities that will improve the return of income, while not losing sight of the advantages of growth in value of the stocks.

The financial statements of the Society are audited by Mc-Carthy, Hargrave & Company. The financial statements are presented in accordance with *Accounting Principles and Reporting Practices for Certain Nonprofit Organizations*, issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Years Ended August 31, 1981 and 1980

A. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of the Society have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, expenses are recorded when incurred and income is recorded when earned. The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements are as follows:

1. Support and Revenue Recognition: Unrestricted gifts, grants, or bequests are recorded as support or revenues when received or pledged. Current restricted gifts, grants, or bequests are recorded as deferred amounts when received or pledged and are recognized as support or revenue or capital additions when expenditures are made which satisfy the terms of the restriction. Gifts to endowment funds are recognized as capital additions when received or pledged.

2. Buildings and Equipment: Buildings are depreciated over their estimated useful lives on the declining-balance method. Equipment is depreciated over its estimated useful life on the straight-line method.

3. Library Collections: Books and other valuable items in the Society's collection are expensed as purchased.

4. Pension Plan: The Society makes contributions to a defined contribution retirement plan for all eligible employees. Pension expense amounted to \$37,568 and \$30,497 for the years ended August 31, 1981 and 1980, respectively.

5. Government Grants: Grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities support various projects of the Society. Grant support is recognized to the extent of eligible expenses, which are subject to audit.

6. Marketable Securities: Marketable securities of the various funds are pooled for investment purposes. The equity of each fund participating in the pool is represented by units which are issued or redeemed on the basis of periodic market values. Distribution of realized gains and losses on security transactions and income is based upon the number of units in the pool owned by each fund.

Report of the Treasurer

Common stocks are recorded at the lower of cost or market value and bonds and notes are recorded at cost. Investment management fees are charged to the unrestricted fund in a fiscal year when the Society incurs net realized losses from security transactions and are allocated to all funds when net realized gains on security transactions are realized.

7. Functional Allocation of Expenses: The cost of providing various programs and other activities has been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activity and changes in fund balances. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.
