#### CORRIGENDA

Delete Addenda 25, Thomas Boulton's *The voyage* (1773 and 1789) as the original edition (Liverpool, 1770), now in MH, proves that the text was first printed abroad by an English seaman.

Delete Wegelin 647, A moral ode for the year 1771 [No imprint,

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1771?], as it is an English imprint attributed now to Edward Perronet (1721–92).
